

Back in May, Paula and I were up in Pontiac at the Pontiac Museum to participate in a car show sponsored by Midwest Firebirds. That club has consistently been a strong supporter of our annual car show there so I wanted to go up and support one of their events. While we were there, Penny Dye told us that the City of Springfield had reached out and wanted to have some cars for a display at the Route 66 tribute area on the state fairgrounds. For those of us coming from the St. Louis/St. Charles area, the obvious meeting point was the old Chain of Rocks Bridge parking area. Unfortunately, that is closed due to construction in the area, as is the east-bound entrance onto 270 from Riverview. So, we ended up meeting at the Schnucks off of Bellefontaine road. Gathering there were 4 of our 11 cars. Paula and I, and Brian and Amy O'Sullivan, both in our 2004 GTOs, Tom and Terry Oxler in their 1966 GTO, and Barb and Earl Lewis in their 1967 GTO. We left the parking lot about 7:30 and at that time of the morning traffic was light, so we made good time to Springfield.

The rest of the cars were meeting us at the Schnucks in Springfield near the fair-grounds.
